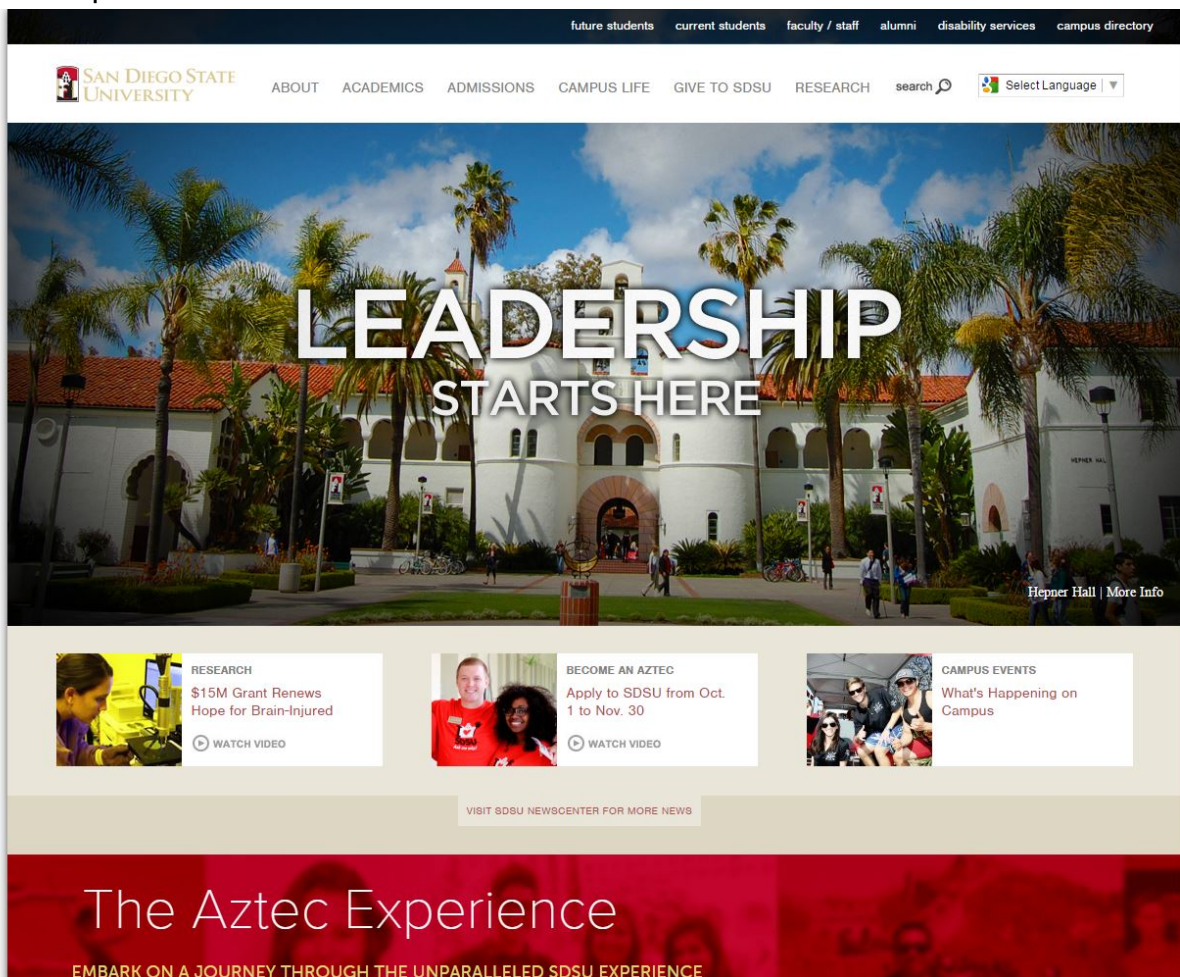
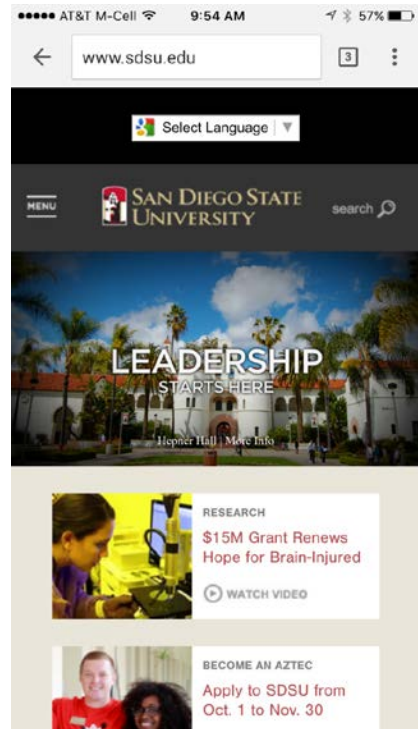

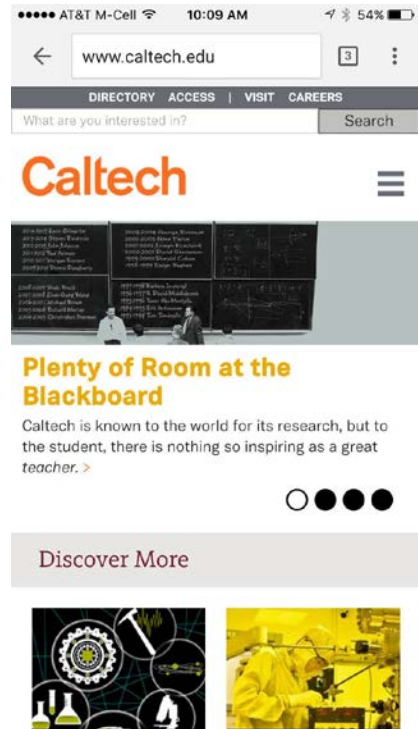
Desktop:

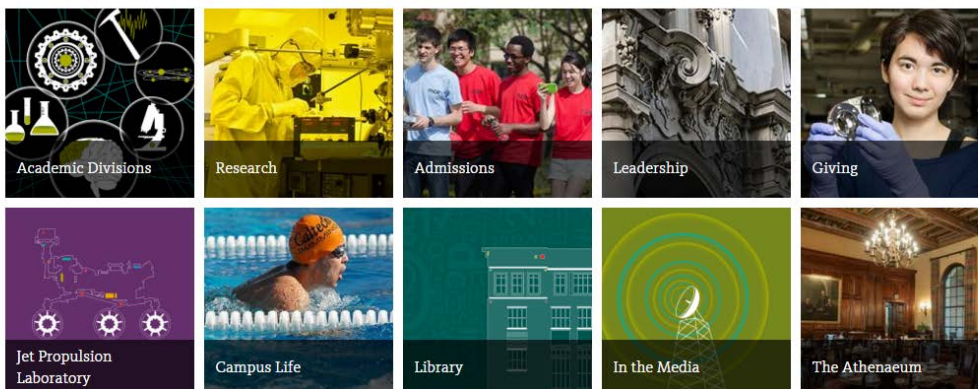
One problem I have detected on this site is that when you scale it down, open the menu, then scale it up, the menu remains on the page though the styling remains the same.



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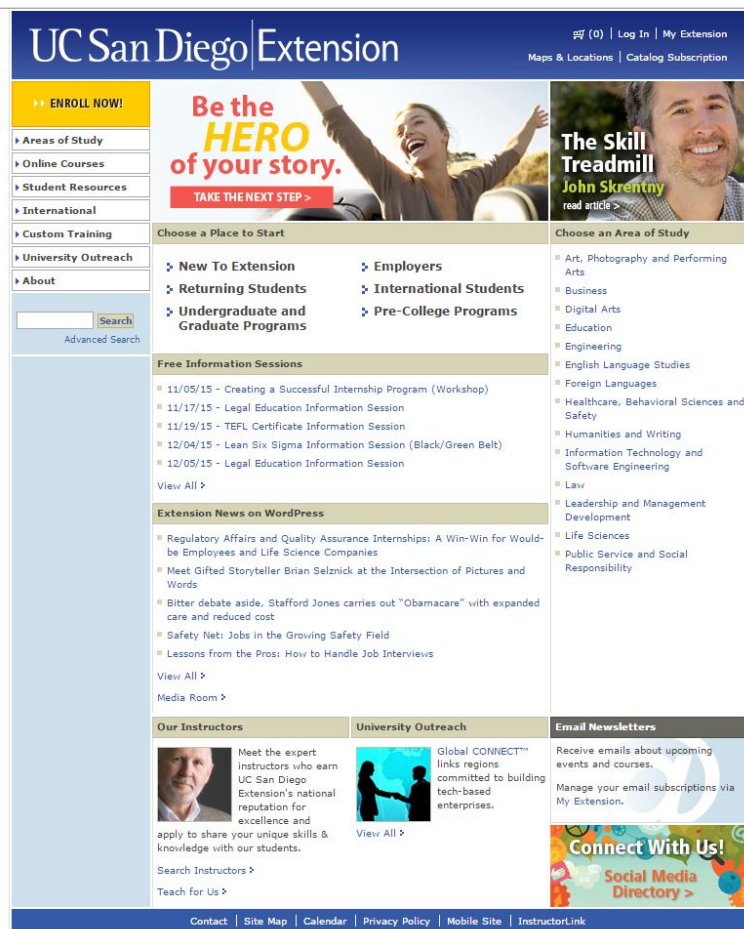
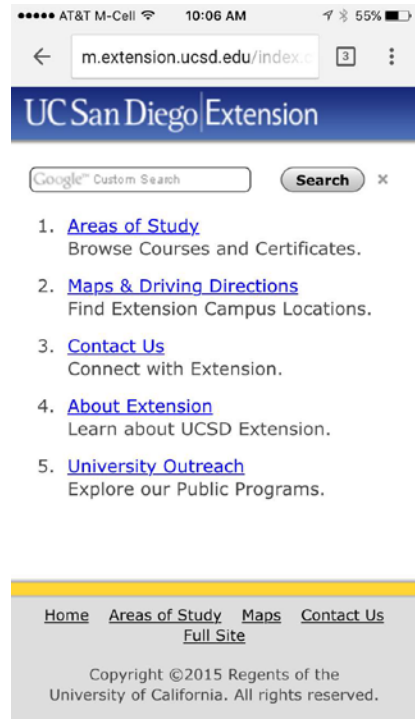
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## Bad Sites:
